17th Sunday of the Year 30th of July 2023

Dear Parishioners and Friends of our parish, we are so happy that you could join us today to celebrate the 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time.

There are many sad stories that are told concerning the death of people and the wills that they leave behind. It happens all too often that the relatives of the deceased person seem more interested in what the person left them in their will, than in what that person meant to them while they were living. Families have been split, and enemies made for life, because people did not get what they thought was coming to them. Their pearl of great price was not the love for the person who had died, but the love for what that person would leave for them after death.

The over-riding concern of such people is clearly based on what they have, not on who they are. They have declared to the world that the treasure they seek has to be treasure that one can count. If it doesn't have a price tag on it, then they say it is really not worth that much. Today we are asked to reflect on what our treasure in life really is. When we hear the Scriptures read aloud to us or when we quietly read them ourselves, we need to somehow respond to what they are calling us to.

One of the questions this reading asks of us can be phrased like this: What is the overriding passion in my life? What is so important to me that if I lost it, I also would be lost? What possesses the deepest part of myself so much, that if it were not there, I wouldn't know where to turn

next? We have to force ourselves to answer these basic questions. If we don't, then there is a good chance we will continue on our journey in an aimless fashion, until one day that journey will be over, and we still will not have come to realize why we ever lived. Yes, today's Gospel is that dramatic. There is one important aspect to both of these parables that we shouldn't overlook. The treasure in the field was hidden and needed to be found, and the pearl needed to be seen for what it really was, a priceless treasure.

William Randolph Hearst invested a fortune collecting art treasures from around the world. One day Mr. Hearst read the description of a valuable art item, which he sent his agent abroad to find. After months of searching, the agent reported that he had finally found the treasure. To the surprise of Hearst, the priceless masterpiece was stored in none other than his own warehouse. The multi-millionaire had been searching all over the world for a treasure he already possessed. In our own lives, it is quite possible that we have grown so used to our faith that we no longer see it for the priceless value that it has. Perhaps we have always believed in Jesus and his teachings, and now they don't seem that special any more.

Maybe it seems shocking to say that we can grow too used to our faith, but as human beings we have that capacity. We can become careless and casual about the very beliefs that form the foundation of our lives. We all know that over time we can take precious things for granted the love of a spouse or friend or family member, the beauty of a sunrise or the ocean or the mountains. The same thing can happen with our faith. The wonder and the beauty of our faith can fade for us, if we do not take care. Hopefully, if this has happened to us, we can use today's Gospel as the beginning of a new awakening and discovery of the treasure of our faith. But we know it will not just happen on its own. We need to pick up that treasure, hold it in our hands, look at it again from different angles, hold it up to the light, sit in wonder at it.

There are many avenues to this re-discovering of our faith and its beauty. For many people, spiritual reading holds the key to rediscovery. As we read how other people see their faith and what it means to them, we can be moved to re-examine how it can infuse our whole life with new meaning. It can change the way we look at our marriage partner, our children or parents. It can help us through difficult times and times of deep grief. Prayer is absolutely essential on the path of rediscovery. As we place ourselves in God's presence over and over, each day, even for very short periods of time, we will gradually come to see the treasure of our faith in a new and revealing light.

The National Pilgrimage to Carfin


